3.8 mc-This band has resulted in some amazing dx in the p pst few weeks. As far as known none of thee local stations have been lucky enough to work any of it. However many members reported hearing the "G"" stations on several occeassions, around 3750 kc. Ves have been heard working G. PAO and F stations as well as calling a ZL. Cuban and Mexican stations are on almost every nite but almost impossible to read as they work in our band.

7 mc. - Continues to hold up as far as the dx is encerned. Europe and South American stations are heard regularily. With low power and intelligent operating this band is a good place to make some good dx contacts. 14 mc. In general twenty has not been too good and dx has been very inconsistent. ZSs were heard several evenings with s8 sigs. European entacts were irregular and most sigs had poor readability. Several mornings in March VKs were heard with fairly good strengh on both fone and cw. The best off the continent sigs were still the SS Americans who pour in both morning and evening. 28 mc. This is still the best all round dx band with new countries apprearing consistently. Ten is still the only place to get some of the rare ones, and all omtinents have been heard in a 24 hour period.
