LAST MEETING.

The much delayed Ladies' Night is now history and from what we can gather, everyone had a very fine evening. Reg Varcoe VE3RR, Chairman of the Health and Welfare Baanch of the Belleville Civil Defence Board told us what might be expected of Belleville in the event of a National emergency. In view of some of the things that could happen, it is obvious that if the hams are to be of any service to the Civil Defence Board during a time of emergency or war, mobile equipment is a "must". It is up to us now to get these mobile rigs built and as Gord Turney pointed out, we will be strickly on our own for Field Day this year and this will be an excellent opportunity for us to try out and demonstrate our Emergency equipment. This equipment cannot be built in a day. We have approximately two months to Field Day, so immediate action is necessary.

NEXT MEETING. Wednesday May 2nd.

In the past it has been customary for us to have a Hobby Night for our May meeting. This is an opportunity for you to display your home built equipment. There will be excellent prizes for the best equipment on display and it will be well worth while to bring your "Grid Dipper", VFO, VHF equipment, electronic key, mobile equipment or any equipment you have made for your own use in connection with your Ham Station. The Club executive wish to make this a display of equipment that has not been presented at any previous hobby night and also wish to exclude any pieces of equipment that have won prizes at previous hobby nights. Your executive have issued a special request, that each member attending the meeting display at least one piece of equipment. This is your hobby and your hobby exhibit, so please make a special effort to bring something to exhibit on Wednesday night. The members of the Club will judge the exhibits. Each display will be numbered and each member will be given a slip of paper containing the numbers allotted to the various pieces of equipment. Ten points will be allowed for each member. He can examine the gear, give all ten points to one display if he wishes, or break it up in whatever manner he wishes. These slips are then tabulated and the winner determined.

EMERGENCY CO-ORDINERATOR
