Life in a One Ham Town by Hertel Rennie It must be a sign of advancing years when one is tempted to reminisce about the good old days. However we do occasionaly look back to our high school days when came the first realization that DC came from batteries and AC came from the hydro line. Sometime later we acquired a Model T Ford spark coil transmitter and the call 3 IU. (There was no VE profix in those days). Of course hot shot ignition batteries didn't last very long and we bought a toy transformer out of the Wm. B. Duck catalogue. The transformer arrived and was hooked up. In twenty minutes it went up in smoke. Thus we learned that there was 25 cycle and 60 cycle AC. We had our home made loose coupler tuner and galena xtal detector. This gave way to a double filament audiotron vacuum tube plus a tickler winding for the loose coupler. A storage battery plus a B battery of many flash light cells and a new ara was born. After that we were getting music from KDKA. Following a lapse of some years we found ourselves in the Marmora district and decided that George Grammars push pull 45 oscillator would set us up in ham radio again. We had lots of key clicks and blanketting. In fact the neighbours were hearing this stuff as late as 2 or 3 years after wl left our VE3JB call letters lapse about 1937. The ham bug remained dormant for another ten years till the war surplus equipment was responsible for a new call VE3BSU in 1947. Maybe we are back to stay this time.
