

Listening around the bands -- by Harry Pitt VE3BND

80 meters: The skip is definitely increasing in a south and western direction, as stations in more districts are heard. The Carribean area and South Americans are clear, and there should soon be good openings to New Zealand coming with the change towards spring weather.

40 meters: For general coverage this frequency has shown the best results during this month. There were good openings to England and Brazil, Panama and British Colombia, with very little fading and quiet static conditions.

20 meters: The band skip continues to swing around rapidly; in the early morning the German stations are more active and there seems to be more of them working out. The North Africa CN8 fone stations were very active, and the VE8 district sigs nice and clear. The Angola and Congo continue to come through well but the South American area was just about a blank spot.
