

He did report that he had received a letter from the Toronto FM Society but since it contained nothing constructive, it was not tabled.

- Other requestes for frequency changed and new frequencies were studied by the frequency committee in separate session.
- The Chairman asked for a donation of \$1.00 per member per meeting to cover mailing costs. \$2.00 per member was collected to cover the previous and present meetings.
- all items on the agenda were cleared up and disposed of. 5.
- VE3RL expressed his regrets that the interference problem made necessary a frequency change. He said that it was his feeling & many Toronto area Amateurs expressed the view also that the problem could have been solved had we

Code Name: SEARCH (Hidden-Transmitter Hunt)

Date: Saturday, March 15th, 1975 - 10:00 A.M.

Location: DELLEVILLE - all units will meet at 10 a.m. sharp

behind Shell gas station at quinte Mall. Odometer readings

will be recorded by operator Hidden Transmitter mobile.

all Search mobile units will immediately proceed to starting

area in the Thompson Furniture parking lot (west side of 14

highway, 1 mile north of 401) and remain there until Hidden

Transmitter mobile makes his first transmission ---
the search is then on:

1. Search Mobiles

(a) any and all types of equipment and vehicles permitted (b) Must remain silent thru out entire exercise (except for priority/emergency traffic)

(c) must remain on 146.52 MHz (or whatever other frequency required for their individual communication with the hidden transmitter) and may not switch back and forth as this would not be fair!

(d) search time duration: l hour only(e) the Winner is the mobile station operator who selects the most direct route from start to finish (that is, the lowest odometer reading).

(f) may have other persons in vehicles to assist in search (g) may leave at 3 min. intervals.

2. Hidden Transmitter Mobile

(a) will make 30 sec. duration transmissions every 3 mins. on 146.52 MHz (and on any other 2m frequency to accommodate those search mobiles without 146.52 as previously arranged).

(b) will remain stationary within Belleville city limits.

(c) will record odometer readings of all participating search vehicles at the beginning and the end of the exercise.

(d) will officially start and end the exercise.

- (e) each 30 sec. transmission should include his station call, identify exercise SEARCH, request co-operation of all other stations to remain free of 146.52 MHz during exercise and may report on those Search Mobiles which have successfully completed the assignment.
- 3. two or more SEARCH exercises may be undertaken if participants desire.
