Don't forget Rick VE3EJB who has set up the Autopatch repeater at the Bell school. A lot of time and effort has gone into this repeater. It's open and it's free as is VE3KBR. Your club membership helps keep VE3KBR going. In Rick's case he is on his own. How about users kicking in a bit to help him.

A FEW HINTS AND TIPS TO NEWCOMERS TO TWO METERS

A repeater is a device which retransmits received signals in order to provide improved communication range and coverage. This is accomplished by locating the antenna on the highest elevation possible. Repeaters then are able to extend the range of mobile to mobile and mobile to base communications.

Repeaters fall into two categories - closed and open. A closed repeater is one which is used only by the members of the sponsoring group. These repeaters are usually accessed by a tone or combination of tones. Its use by non members is not encouraged. An open repeater is one in which transient operators are welcome. We are fortunate in our area that all of the machines are of the open variety. VE3KBR, Belleville on 146.40 /147.00 and VE3PBO, Peterborough and VE3KER, Kingston both on 146.34/146.94 Mhz. Wealso have in Belleville an Autopatch repeater operated by VE3EJB. Rick will be describing this repeater in full at the December meeting.

A few "Dos" and "Don'ts" on Repeater Operation

1) Identify yourself. Thus VE3XYZ Mobile 3. Stations receiving this know you are monitoring the frequency.

2) Do not call CQ on a repeater frequency.

3) Make transmissions short.

4) Leave sufficient time between transmissions to allow another station to break.

5) Most mobile and base stations in this area monitor VE3KBR. After initial contact and if the stations are in range of one another they should QSY to a simplex channel. Simplex frequencies used are 146.52, 146.58 and 146.55 Mhz. This will free the repeater for other traffic.

6) VE3KBR can not be classed as a busy repeater, therefore it is quite permissable for two or more base stations to work one another, e.g. Belleville to Kingston, bearing in mind that mobile stations have priority and allowing them to break and use the frequency if requested.

7) During inversions the normal line of sight range changes and it is possible to hit repeaters that under normal conditions are not heard. To avoid this base stations should use the minimum amount of power required and orient their antenna so as to not key up the distant repeater. In our case this usually means turning the antenna to a more
