- 7) Your editor was pleased to receive an enquiry from British Columbia about ARES. This was in response to the columns by VE3SV in T.C.A. and Q.S.T. that I helped with.
- 8) Those of you at last May's lecture by me which was in part on G5RV type antennas, may recall that I said that the lengths can be adjusted. VE3IN spoke to me not long ago about his own experiments along that line, and he is at present using 51 feet one way, 94 feet the other, and the open wire line is 77 feet. He puts out a very good signal on 80, 20, and 10 metres with no tuner required. It just shows what can be done with difficult sites and a lot of cut-and-try.
- 9) Jim VE3DCX will be in Aylmer Police College for the next three months taking advanced training. Keep an ear out on 75 metres, and if he is trying to reach home at Tweed, call up myself or VE3AUU or one of the Tweed amateurs. I think there are three 'phone patches on Tweed exchange, so let's see that Jim gets to call home.
- 10) Today's rate of political inspired inflation is not considered too bad by some people, but at 6% per year your money is only worth 5/9 of todays's value in only ten years.
- 11) Ron VE3IVC who is very active in photography as well as in amateur radio achieved second prize in the recent Ontario Hydro photography contest. Congratulations.

- 13) The new radio amateur directory, dated January 1, 1989, has been changed in small but important ways. Q.A.R.C. deserves credit for having pioneered this concept some years ago. My work simply modifies what was put in place and which has served us all well. You will observe the enlarged VHF repeater list. Also, the persons responsible for the repeaters are now shown. Should a repeater fail, anyone can notify the proper person. Each new page will show its revision date. The area codes have been added to the 'phone numbers. The first names of all amateurs are shown, so you can quickly find them. All of the police numbers and other groups have been researched and new numbers put in where required. The area covered has been changed to show three counties. We believe we have all the amateurs in Hastings, Prince Edward and Northumberland. I am hopeful that it will be drawn to my attention if anyone has been missed. This directory ignores a person's affiliation or lack of it, and is wholly intended to be a serviceable tool, particularly in time of emergency. We all recognize

that many of our ranks are not very active on the air, or physically handicapped in some way, when called upon in an emergency situation. This little booklet puts us in touch with each other. The price of the directory has been set at \$2.00. If mailed, the price will be \$2.75 postpaid. Any funds that accrue over direct costs will be assigned to the Q.A.R.C. general fund. This fund is spent almost wholly on the VE3KBR repeater, ARES expenses, and the club bulletin. The work on the directory was under my direction, and while a good many of you assisted, the main bulk of the work fell on Bill VE3NFP, and the Loyalist College computer system. Type data may be had from VE3NFP.
