***** SPECIAL REPRINT OF CARF NEWS SERVICE ******

CARF AND CRRL MEMBERS VOTE "YES" TO MERGER -- Members of CRRL and CARF have voted a resounding "YES" to merge into the Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC). In a nation-wide secret ballot vote taken over the past six weeks, eligible amateurs from CARF and CRRL have agreed to dissolve their respective organizations in favour of RAC. The results of the August 24th vote count is as follows:

CRRL MEMBERS - 97% IN FAVOUR. CARF MEMBERS - 92% IN FAVOUR.

The results were handed over to CARF and CRRL by the Canadian Corps of Commissionaires, who acted as scrutineers and tellers for the recent vote. This gives CRRL and CARF the official "go ahead" to proceed with final legal and financial actions to dissolve their respective societies and to incorporate RAC. Once incorporated, RAC's interim Directors and Executive Officers will be appointed as agreed-to in the contract between CARF and CRRL.

The following article is a reprint from the September issue of The Canadian Amateur.

While the club is only a part of the broad array of interests embodied in Amateur radio, it is not unreasonable to suggest that it is a most essential part. The club, like an extended family, is the place where we learn, where we share, where we grow and ultimately where we reach out the world to nurture and to protect our hobby. Without the local club, Amateur radio would not likely exist in the form it is today. Yet one wonders if some Amateurs really understand the vital dynamics of support that the club provides to our hobby!

Building and operating are the essence of Amateur radio. These are areas of individual interest and accomplishment...the core of what it's all about. However, Ham radio is more than individual accomplishment. As with all major aspects of modern life, there are social and political essentials which must be addressed. The well-being of Amateur radio as an institution depends on our ability to defend and advance our hobby. There is no better place to do this than with the club.

'Teaching clubs' are most important! Luckily for us, there are clubs who specialize in this vital service to Amateur radio! Luckily for us there are talented people who give freely of their time to teach. No doubt the tremendous growth of licensed Amateurs in Canada in recent years is due in large measure to the clubs who promote and sponsor courses to obtain government certification.
