Foxhunting in Montreal

At the beginning of my vacation this year, my wife and I decided to spend a few days in Montreal and participate in the annual Montreal Amateur Radio Club foxhunt. Well, perhaps the part about the foxhunt was more my decision than hers.

This year the Montreal Foxhunt was a true "International" style hunt. It took place in Terra Cotta Park in Pointe Claire, a suburb on the West Side of Montreal. An international style hunt uses five transmitters which are distributed through a woods or forest. The five foxes transmit on the same frequency, one at a time for one minute each, making up a five-minute cycle. A sixth transmitter is placed at the finish line. It transmits continuously on a different frequency and serves to help the hunters find their way to the

finish area. The hunters hunt on foot and attempt to find as many foxes as possible in a fixed time period, usually 2 hours. Each of the fox locations is marked with a small coloured plaque and has a paper punch with a unique shape. The hunters carry a card and punch the card as they find each transmitter. This year the Montreal hunt was organized by Steve, VA2SMF with help from his father Ray, VE2SJA. The hunt was very well organized and everything worked as planned, each hunter was provided with a very good map of the park and everything worked well with the exception of a small glitch in one of the foxes. From my perspective the only disappointment was the relatively small turnout, there were only four teams hunting. Steven is talking about organizing another hunt in the fall. If he does, perhaps we can organize a small contingent of QARC hunters (or any other interested hunters), and make a day trip.

Terra Cotta Park is about 100 acres in size and about 1/2 of the area is very dense bush There are five main trails that run through the bush and many, many side trails. Some of the side trails are dead end and some serve as a shortcut connection between the main trails. The bush is dense enough that it is not practical to walk through it, you have to stick to the trails. The foxes were scattered around the park, some in an open area and some in the thick brush. My basic strategy was to go to the closest fox (strongest signal), then from that point to the next closest and so on until I had found all five. The fox that I had the most difficulty with was adjacent to a building close to the start/finish point. All told it took me 92 minutes to find five foxes. I estimate I walked about 4-5 kilometers.

For this hunt I borrowed a 2-element "tape measure" beam and offset attenuator from Brian, VE3GRA. In fact, all of the hunters but one also used some sort of tape measure beam and active attenuator. I knew from my previous on foot hunts that passive attenuators are not effective once you are within a few hundred feet of the fox. The real problem is the RF leakage through the body of the radio overwhelms the attenuated signal and it is impossible to get a reliable indication of direction. The offset attenuator overcomes this problem and the borrowed equipment worked very well. I was able to get accurate direction readings at a distance of about 10 feet from the foxes. It worked so well that I am in the process of building a duplicate set of equipment. One problem I did have was severe intermod interference. It was so bad that there was usually only a 10 - 20 second period out of each 60-second fox transmission where it was possible to hear the fox signal. This is definitely something that needs to be worked on for the next time.

All teams started at the same time and in this hunt, like most others, it always amazes me how a group of hunters using more or less the same equipment and listening to the same foxes become quickly separated. After about 20 minutes I lost touch with the other teams and didn't see them again for the about the next hour or so until I was close to the finish line. All of the teams were able to find 4 or 5 foxes in times ranging from 92 minutes to 138 minutes.

VE3GLN Amateur of the Year 2000

The RAC Board of Directors takes great pleasure in announcing their election of Glenn McLeod, VE3GLN of Ottawa, as the Canadian Radio Amateur of the Year for 2000. Glenn retired as a Major in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1988 and is currently logistics officer at the Communications Research Centre. He was licensed in 1978 as VO1DV, later as VE3MPR and now VE3GLN. He is active on all bands and modes from 160 metres through to 70 cm with 270 countries confirmed.

Glenn's contributions to amateur radio are many, however it is for one particular achievement that Glenn earned this award for the conception and organization of a record-breaking 35A Field Day entry in the Ottawa-Hull region. It was this event where the opening ceremony was honoured with the presence of representatives from RAC, RAQI and the ARRL. The event was officially opened by Michael Binder, Assistant Deputy Minister, Spectrum Management, Industry Canada, who addressed the public and emphasized the contribution of Amateur Radio to the service of the public.

An engraved silver tray, will be presented to Glenn by Doug Leach, VE3XK, RAC Ontario - North Regional Director.

RAC CONVENTION 2002

IARU Region 2 Conference in Guatemala City

In October, delegates from national Amateur Radio societies from all over the Americas will be meeting at the IARU Region 2 Conference in Guatemala City. These conferences are held once every three years in each of the three IARU Regions.

As a member society of the International Amateur Radio Union, Radio Amateurs of Canada has allocated funding for RAC President Oelke to attend the October 2001 IARU Region II Triennial Conference. To strengthen the Canadian presence, the following volunteers have agreed to join President Oelke in Guatemala City at their own expense; RAC Vice President of Regulatory Affairs, Tim Ellam, VE6SH, RAC Quebec Director Daniel Lamoureux, VE2KA and Jacqueline Lamoureux, VE2AX. President Oelke will act as head of the Canadian Delegation.

On the conference agenda will be some very important issues including the WRC 2003 items on the proposed realignment of the 40 metre band and possible changes to the ITU regulations governing Amateur Radio. RAC has submitted papers seeking support for the Canadian position on both of these questions. RAC has also submitted a paper seeking regional support for its application for a new amateur band at 135 kHz.

There will also be some important administrative matters on the conference agenda. There is a proposal to revise and update the by-laws and constitution of IARU Region 2. There is also a proposal to increase the size of the Region 2 Executive Committee.

These items have been discussed at length by members of the RAC Board, in order to provide guidance and direction to the delegation.

RAC supports the proposed by-law changes, but is opposed to any increase in size of the IARU-Region 2 Executive Committee at this time.
