Quinte Amateur Radio Club Minutes For June 19th, 2002

The meeting was opened by our President, **Peter, VA3PKH** at 7:30 pm outside the meeting room in the packing lot, to allow our guest speaker **Eldon Switzer, VE3HGO**, from Kingston, to demonstrate his <u>Pedestrian Mobile</u> radio equipment. Eldon is a corrections officer in Kingston and received his license in 1974 at the age of 17. His appearance was just like the photo that appeared on the front cover of the May/June issue of The Canadian Amateur surrounded by a multitude of handhelds, Mobile HF gear and portable antennae. A very impressive site! Before his actual on air demonstration he urged all hams to become self-sufficient and be prepared for any emergency. Also he encouraged all hams to join and support the **Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC)** who are working on behalf of all Canadian amateurs to keep and preserve the frequencies they already enjoy; and represent Canadian in International Radio forums associate with Amateur Radio. He thanked the Club for inviting him.

His equipment consists of a compact mobile HF rig, antenna tuner, gel cells for power, and a set of ¼ wave whips that he can switch from 80 to 10 meters, a number of radials to act as an artificial ground, and a GPS. As the photo shows all this gear is contained in a backpack that he modified to accommodate all his gear.

Eldon actually demonstrated his capability by checking into the East Cars Net on 7.255; but, was just barely heard. He tried the Intercontinental Net on 14.300 as a Pedestrian Mobile and got an S7 report!! His presentation concluded about 8:30 pm.

Following his presentation there was an opportunity to take a closer look at all of his equipment. This lasted for about 20 minutes. The meeting moved back into our classroom for coffee and donuts and a rag chew.

Ray, VE3GRK made another presentation showing his very impressive compact mobile QRP radio rig that he uses when he goes hiking and backpacking or for emergency use. The heart of Ray's equipment is the vy popular all-mode all band Yaesu FT817 (5W). Along with his FT817 Ray uses an LDG11 compact tuner, a 7AH Gel Cell, equipped with a solar panel for charging, a unique dipole using 26 ga teflon coated wire enclosed in a pair of Chalk Line housings that contain about 80 ft of wire each. The centers of the dipole are connected to a coax feed line that is supported by a 20 ft. telescoping fishing pole as his mast to support the dipole. Very clever, vy FB! For more information on this equipment es antenna go to www.HFPAC.com, or www.buddipole.com or yahoo groups for FT817s. Ray went a little further by demonstrating his data capabilities using a Visor PDA connected to a TNC connected to his FT817 for Packet. Ray's presentation lasted about 15 minutes, which was as compact as his radio gear!

The QARC members in attendance were treated to two very Fine Business Pedestrian Mobile presentations. Many thanks to Eldon es Ray. No wonder the attendance was 31.

After refreshments the upcoming annual Field Day preparations were discussed. This year we are joining with the **Prince Edward Radio Club (PERC)** and the site is the old school house located East of highway 62 south on Huff's Island road, about 15 Kms south of Belleville. The PERC will set up their dipoles on Fri afternoon. The QARC will

set up their vertical and G5RV on Sat am. It was not decided at meeting time if we will be working as 2A or 3A. (It turned out to be 2A).

Ray reported that the **Tri-County Radio Club** will also participate in Field Day using 3 QRP rigs running as VA3TRI. .

The end of the line for Radio Amateur Callbook:

Radio Amateur Callbook is throwing in the towel and will cease publication of its CD-ROM Callbook product effective with its winter 2003 edition, which will come out in November. "Due to accessibility to the FCC database via the Internet, sales have declined to levels that make it unprofitable to publish future editions," publisher Bob Hughes announced in a recent news release. In 1997, citing "rising costs and increasing demand for electronic publishing" the company phased out its telephone-book-size paper North American and international editions in favor of its CD-ROM product. The 1997 Callbook--the 75th edition--was the last hard-copy version available. The Callbook began publishing in 1920. (From the ARRL Letter - Aug 9, 2002)

Last call for nominations

Canadian radio amateurs are reminded that nominations for the two Radio Amateurs of Canada awards "Member of the Canadian Amateur Radio Hall of Fame" and "RAC Amateur of the Year Award" must be received at RAC Headquarters by September 30, 2002.

The details and rules for nomination for both awards are shown in the July/August issue of The Canadian Amateur and on the RAC web site. Neither the nominees nor nominators need be members of RAC, though these awards are two major examples of the benefits of RAC membership.

RAC Radio Amateur of the Year

To qualify for the title "RAC Radio Amateur of the Year", an individual should have made an outstanding contribution to Amateur Radio in the last year, or have contributed consistently to the welfare of Amateur Radio over several years. RAC directors, officers, and section managers are not eligible for the award while in office, and not in respect to their term(s) of office.

Nominations with supporting documentation are to be addressed to the Secretary, RAC, and received at RAC Headquarters no later than September 30, for consideration for the current year.

Selection of the winning candidate will be by majority vote of the RAC Board of Directors, based on the supporting documentation submitted with the nomination.

The winning candidate will be notified by mail. Due recognition will appear in The Canadian Amateur, and a suitable plaque will be presented at an appropriate time and place.

Canadian Amateur Radio Hall of Fame

Any resident of Canada who holds a current amateur station licence issued by the Government of Canada, or any Canadian amateur radio organization, other than Radio Amateurs of Canada, may submit a nomination for Member of the Canadian Amateur Radio Hall of Fame. Membership in RAC is not mandatory.

- Any resident of Canada who holds a current amateur radio station licence issued by the Government of Canada, except a Radio Amateurs of Canada employee, officer, director, assistant director, volunteer manager, or leadership official in the Field Organization, may be appointed as a Member of the Hall. Membership in RAC is not mandatory. Any eligible person may receive an appointment as Member of the Hall, for outstanding achievement and excellence of the highest degree, for serious and sustained service to Amateur Radio in Canada, or to Amateur Radio at large. Nomination or appointment for Member or Honorary Member of the Hall may be after the death of the nominee.
